Masahiro KAWAI, Dean, Asian Development Bank Institute	
<p>Mr. Kawai joined ADBI in January 2007 after serving as Head of ADB's Office of Regional Economic Integration (OREI) and Special Advisor to the ADB President in charge of regional economic cooperation and integration. Prior to his assumption as Head of OREI, Mr. Kawai was a Professor at the University of Tokyo's Institute of Social Science. Mr. Kawai also worked as Chief Economist for the World Bank's East Asia and the Pacific Region from 1998 to 2001, and as Deputy Vice Minister of Finance for International Affairs of Japan's Ministry of Finance from 2001 to 2003.</p> <p>Mr. Kawai began his career as a Research Fellow at Brookings Institution and then as an Assistant and Associate Professor in the economics department of Johns Hopkins University. Afterwards, he served as an Associate and Full Professor at the Institute of Social Science, University of Tokyo.</p> <p>He served as a consultant at the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System and at the International Monetary Fund, both in Washington, DC. He was also Special Research Advisor at the Institute of Fiscal and Monetary Policy in Japan's Ministry of Finance, and a visiting researcher at the Bank of Japan's Institute for Monetary and Economic Studies and at the Economic Planning Agency's Economic Research Institute.</p> <p>Mr. Kawai has published a number of books and numerous articles on economic globalization, on regional financial integration and cooperation in East Asia, including lessons from the Asian crisis, and on the international currency system.</p> <p>He graduated with his B.A. and M.A. degrees in Economics from the University of Tokyo's Faculty of Economics. He earned his M.S. degree in Statistics and Ph.D. degree in Economics from Stanford University.</p>

<p>Mr. Mine joined the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MOFA) of Japan in 1968 after graduation from the University of Tokyo. Since then, he served in several positions inside and outside of Japan. From 2001 to 2007, he served as Ambassador for the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia, Ambassador in charge of Global Environment, Ambassador at the Permanent Representative of Japan at the Conference of Disarmament, Ambassador for the Assistance Coordination for Afghanistan and the Chief Representative of Japan for the Normalization Negotiations with the D.P.R.K.</p> <p>He had lectured on the International Relations at Doshisha Univ. in 2007 and on the Security and Disarmament at the University of Tokyo, Komaba from 2008 to 2012. Masashi NISHIHARA, President of Research Institute for Peace and Security

Dr. Nishihara is President of the Research Institute for Peace and Security. Until Mar. 2006 he served as President of the National Defense Academy, Yokosuka, for six years. In 1977-99 he was Professor of International Relations at the Academy. During that period, he also served as Director of the First Research Department of the National Institute for Defense Studies, Tokyo, in 1993-95, and as Dean of the Academy's School of Social Sciences in 1996-2000. In 1979 he was Visiting Fellow at the Australian National University, Canberra, and in 1981-82 he also was Visiting Fellow at the Rockefeller Foundation, New York.

In 2001-03 he was a member of Prime Minister Junichiro Koizumi's Task Force on External Relations, and in 2004-06 a member of the Weapons of Mass Destruction Commission (chaired by Hans Blix). In Feb. 2013 he became a member of Prime Minister Abe's consulting committee on the establishment of National Security Council. In May 2013 he headed an experts panel on territorial matters, established by Ichita Yamamoto, the minister in charge of territories and sovereignty.

Dr. Nishihara is former chairman of the Japan Association of International Security, and current chairman of the Security Forum (Anzenhosho Konwakai). He is currently a member of the International Institute for Strategic Studies and of the Experts and Eminent Persons Group of the ASEAN Regional Forum. He frequently participates in international seminars and conferences, including the Japanese and Russian Experts Conference regularly organized by Anpoken and IMEMO.

His recent publications include: *Nichibei Doomei saikoo (Reconsidering the Japan-U.S. Alliance)* (co-editor, 2010), and "Asian Perspectives in 2011: China's 'Coercive' Diplomacy Leads to New Power Realignment," *RIPS Policy Perspectives*, No. 11 (Aug. 2011), and "East Asian Security and Japan's Response," in *Guroobaruna kiki no kozo to Nihon no senryaku (The structure of global crisis and Japan's strategy)*, eds. Kazuo Yoshida and Shigeru Fujimoto (2013). In Feb. 2013 he was awarded The Sankei Shimbun's best columnist prize for 2012.

He graduated from the Law Department of Kyoto University and received his M.A. and Ph.D. in political science from the University of Michigan.

Daisuke KOTEGAWA, Research Director of the CIGS

Mr. Kotegawa was the Executive Director for Japan at the IMF from Jul. 2007 to Aug. 2010. In this capacity he was in charge of the unprecedented level of cut off the budget and the staff numbers of the IMF, approved various new measures of the IMF to tackle the world economic crisis. Among other things he chaired the last meeting of the New Arrangements to Borrow, which successfully raised \$ 600 billion for the IMF. Since late 1990s he was in charge of dealing with financial crisis in Japan, including:

- (i) the liquidation of Yamaichi Securities, Sanyo Securities in 1997 in the Securities Bureau of the Japanese Ministry of Finance,
- (ii) the nationalization of LTCB, NCB in 1998 in the Financial Supervisory Authority and,
- (iii) the establishment of the Industrial Revitalization Corporation of Japan in 2003, as well as,
- (iv) the creation of business recovery funds in the Development Bank of Japan.

He was also involved in various international negotiations, including US-Japan Framework Consultation, WTO Negotiation on Financial Services (Counterparts were Prof. Summers and Tim Geitner), US-Japan Negotiation on the Structural Impediments Initiatives, World Bank Group Capital Increase which raised the Japan's status from No 5 to No 2, Yen-\$ Committee and OECD Guidelines on Transfer Pricing. He served as the vice chairman of the Committee on Fiscal Affairs at OECD and initiated the committee on Tax Competition which established the Black List. He also worked in Minister's Secretariat, Budget Bureau, Tax Bureau, Finance Bureau and International Bureau in the MOF.

His assignment outside the MOF includes Senior Financial Economist in the World Bank (in charge of IDA negotiation and design of new financial instruments) and the Deputy Vice Governor of Yamagata prefecture.

Recently he has been invited for presentation by Harvard Business School, Cheung Kong Graduate School of Business at Beijing University, Fudan University in Shanghai, Lee Kuan Yew School of Public Policy in Singapore, National University Higher School of Economics in Moscow, Vanderbilt University, American University in Washington DC, St. Petersburg International Economic Forum and Asia Innovation Initiative.

Mr. Kotegawa holds an MBA from Stanford University (1979) and a BA in Law, from the University of Tokyo (1975). His extracurricular activities include Russian interpreter for Soviet artists while as a student of the University of Tokyo. He is fluent in Japanese, English, and good in Russian and German.
