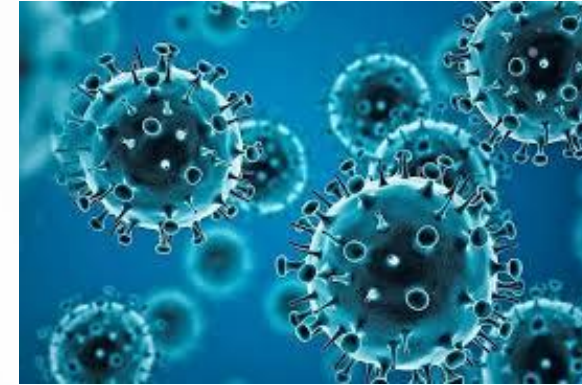

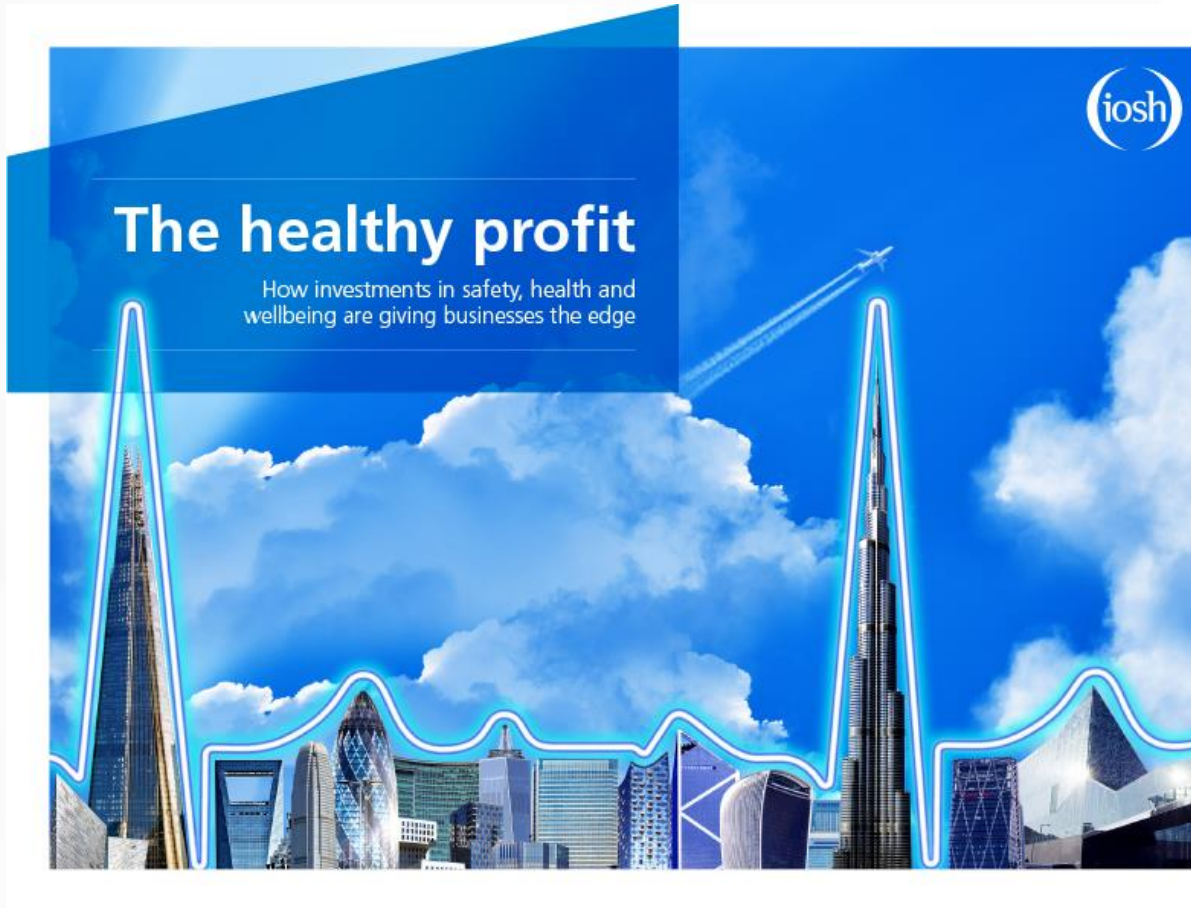

“A Gift to the Future: Safety, Health & Well-being for **8 Billion People**”

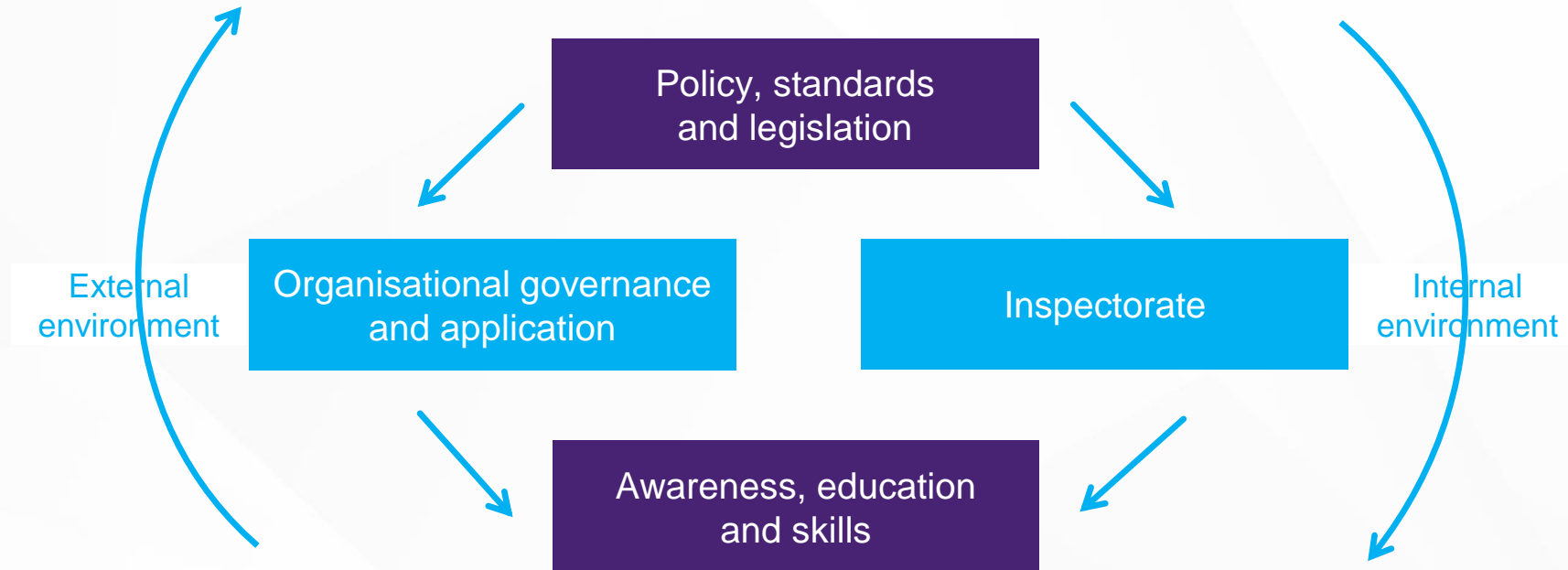
- **2.78 million deaths due to work**
- **374 million non-fatal work accidents**
- **2.4 million deaths from occupational disease**
- **~ 4% of world GDP = work accidents and diseases**





- Report highlights the investments being made by forward-thinking organisations
- An IOSH-commissioned survey found barriers exist for many businesses
- Investment in the safety and health of a workforce should be a core strategic aim
- Transparency and openness in reporting on safety and health performance

What is Zero Harm – Understanding the concept

Zero harm refers to an approach to occupational safety that has been adopted by many workplaces.

The goal of a zero-harm approach is to operate a workplace without exposing an individual to injury through the implementation of safe work systems.

Zero-harm approaches are linked to exceeding safety regulations.

VISION ZERO 

Zero harm – aspiration or goal

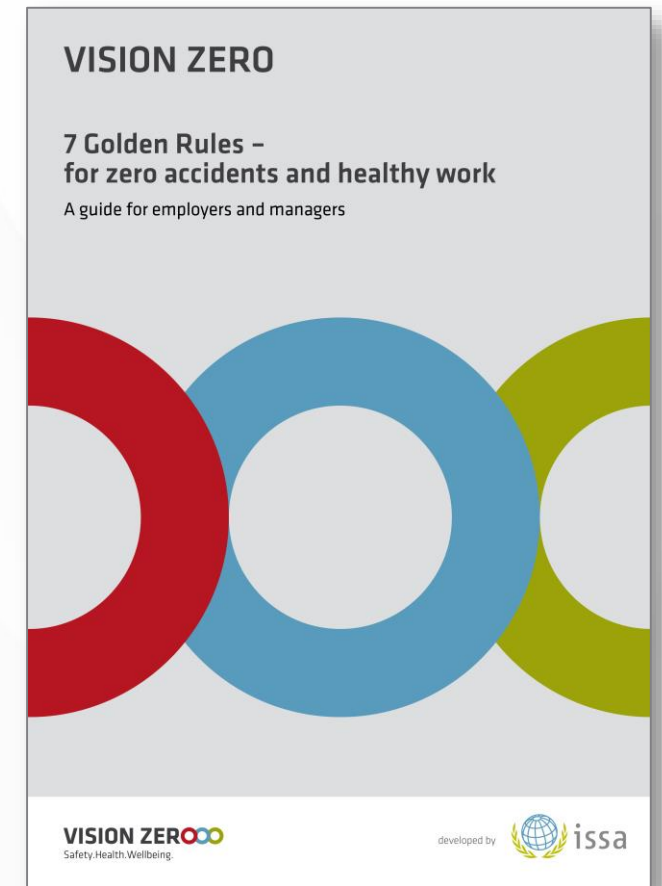


- All occupational accidents, harm and diseases are preventable
- Zero Harm is a process rather than a target
- It is a transformational approach to prevention
- It builds a culture of prevention that integrates both safety, health and wellbeing at work

Vision Zero design – neat, simple and visionary

- The **Vision Zero approach is flexible**. One can focus on health, on safety or on well-being issues depending on what is most relevant
- With this flexibility **Vision Zero is of benefit for all**, for governments and health and safety organizations in any country and for companies of any scale
- “**Seven Golden Rules**” form the roadmap towards **Vision Zero**, based on successful, practical management concepts
